From our Principal:

Start of Term 1

Welcome back everyone and whilst there are some obvious adjustments to the usual start of the year for schools, it is wonderful to see the students in class and out in the yard enjoying their time together as normal as possible at this point in time.

As outlined in the Compass Newsfeed last week there are a number of vital safety measures in place to reduce the risk of COVID-19 spreading throughout the Bell Community, however nothing is fool proof and we will all continue to do our best to implement the Department's return to school plan. Key COVID-safe steps implemented under the latest Operations Guide include:

- <u>Ventilation</u>: use of air purifiers and open windows/doors will keep the air flow as clean and fresh as possible in all 19 grades plus the three indoor specialist rooms (Art, Italian and Music)
- <u>Daily outdoor learning</u>: when practical, lessons will be conducted outside and all grades will eat outdoors when weather permits. Shade sail quotes are being prepared for the next phase of DET's outdoor learning grants program. This will take time for approval and installation given it's a state-wide initiative
- <u>Vaccinations</u>: staff will continue booking in for their third booster dose in the coming weeks as mandated by the government, and the 5-11 yo vaccination option is open to all Victorian families. Please note that all school visitors and volunteers who enter buildings will need to show evidence of a third dose by mid-March.
- <u>Limited mixing of grades inside</u>: maintaining grade bubbles as much as possible is still a priority even though our usual practice is for cohorts to connect and collaborate at various times each week. Currently, any year level gatherings are conducted outside for purposeful educational reasons only.
- Rapid Antigen Testing (RATS): families have all received their first round of RATs for the weeks 1 and 2. The second round of kits will be handed out late next week in readiness for week 3 and 4 home testing.
- <u>General hygiene practices</u>: the basics of hand washing, sanitising and coughing/sneezing etiquette is still crucial along with wearing face masks inside (compulsory for Grades 3-6 and highly recommended for P-2). Please note, we are yet to receive any back-up supplies from DET so <u>BYO masks are crucial every day</u>. We have a moderate supply of disposable masks that we have sourced as a school, but that supply will always be limited.

The arrangements for students and staff who contract COVID-19, or are deemed a household contact, can be found on the school website along with all the above details. Simply go to the Communications tab and look for 'COVID Safe Practices'.

Staffing adjustments over the Holidays

We announced two new teaching staff in the final week of Term 4, and I am pleased to say both Hannah Jamieson (Grade 5C) and Teresa Flatman (Grade 2C) have settled in well. Parents/carers of children in those grades might be able to pop in and see them during the coming weeks, however there will be the formal 'getting to know you' meetings in Week 6 (7-11 March) for some more in depth conversations.

We also welcome back Robin Griffin to the school who has been on extended leave for a number of years. Robin will be working specific times of the day on Thursdays and Fridays supporting the High Ability Program for DET

selected students in the senior years. This is the second year of the program and those small groups of students are engaged in an online program with local teacher support to extend their capabilities in either Literacy or Numeracy.

Unfortunately, there two farewells from our Education Support staff with Effie Kyrpigikidis and Rein Edwards leaving Bell for various personal reasons. A full time support person will be selected this term through the usual application and interview process.

Capital Works Project

The new gym/hall and main building upgrades are on track to start at the end of Term 1 as we move to the tender phase in the coming weeks. The double portable has been removed and once we have finalised the successful contractor for the project, we will negotiate the details of the construction site and access points. We are hoping for reduced disruptions to the south end of the school grounds, with site plans clearly communicated to everyone via newsletters and the website once established. Just like the 2019 building project, the safety of the school community is the highest priority.

We hope to be able to share the final plans with the community, starting with the students once the tender process is completed. Then everyone can see the great benefits this project will bring to the school and the wider community after hours.

Community Skills on Offer?

There are times when specific skill sets and expertise from our community can make a real difference to the school in our ongoing efforts to make Bell a better place for learning and teaching. Currently, one of our amazing parents, Dion Keech is working with me on redesigning the shelter shed into a kids' hub for passive and social play. We are at the VSBA approval stage of this exciting school project and need a quantity surveyor to help with a Cost A plan to finalise the planning stage. If there is a community member with these skills who can help, or someone knows of a person we can engage to complete that work, please contact me as soon as practical on david.twite@education.vic.gov.au

We are seeking some new fundraising leaders to step into this exciting role and help co-ordinate the range of events that we hope to run throughout the year. Event captains are appointed to organise the details of each event but without a small team of leaders, the effectiveness cannot be guaranteed. Currently, we have over 120 community members who have entered their information and, with school life beginning to open up, we hope to re-start a range of school base initiatives and bring talented parents/carers back into our school to help create an even better Bell.

From our Assistant Principal:

Grade Level Information Nights

Year 1-6 grade level information nights will be conducted in Week 3 of this term (Monday 14 February - Friday 18 February). These nights are an important opportunity for parents/carers to understand the learning foci, teaching and learning approaches and extra-curricular events and activities for the year. For Prep families this will be conducted in Week 6.

Other important administration reminders will be sent to families via Compass in the coming weeks and will be available on the school website for future reference. More information regarding the format of the night, exact dates and times for each year level will be communicated early next week via a separate Compass Newsfeed.

Getting to Know You Meetings

During Week 6 (March 7-11) of this term our **Year 1-6** teachers will be conducting 1:1 Getting to Know You Meetings. These meetings facilitate individual time for parents/carers to share information about their child with this year's classroom teacher/s and are an important opportunity for you to:

- meet and get to know your child's teacher(s)
- help your child's teacher(s) understand more about your child
- exchange information to support your child's learning, social and emotional needs
- make plans with the teacher(s) about how you can both support your child
- continue to strengthen the crucial home-school partnership

These meetings, whilst about your child as a learner, are not designed to give detailed progress reports of student achievement given the early scheduling. Exact days and times that Getting to Know You Meetings will occur for each year level will be communicated with parents/carers in the coming weeks.

Prep teachers will be conducting Getting to Know You Meetings in Week 3 (February 14-18) and Prep families will be sent information via Compass early next week regarding the exact dates and times, as well as information about how to book a meeting.

Tutoring for 2022

2021 was another extraordinary and challenging one for everyone in the school community. As was the case previously, the remote learning experience last year was different for every student. While some students thrived and some continued progressing to the expected level, others will benefit from additional intensive learning support in 2022.

Maria Tevelis and Xenia Matani, our Intervention/Tutoring staff for this year, will provide additional targeted teaching to identified students in need of extra assistance with their learning in either Reading or Mathematics.

Maria will concentrate two days a week on providing this targeted support. Xenia will provide this support for the equivalent of 1.5 days per week, while also focusing on her role as Wellbeing leader for the remainder of the time. Intervention staff, in consultation with teachers and year level teams, are currently working together to identify students in need of tutoring support. These judgements will be based on multiple sources of evidence including Victorian Curriculum achievement levels and classroom-based assessments.

Within the constraints of the additional funding, not all students achieving below the expected level in a learning area will receive additional support with an intervention/tutoring teacher. Data will continue to be monitored in an ongoing manner as students' progress throughout the year and appropriate adjustments to the program will be made.

Throughout the year all students, regardless of their achievement level, will continue to receive high quality classroom instruction though their classroom teacher who will teach to each student's point of need, that is key to differentiation and ensuring learning growth and success for every student.

Identified students will begin intervention/tutoring in the coming weeks and further information will be communicated directly to families.

At times, to document and promote the excellent work of Bell Primary School, photographs or digital images of students or their school work are shared with the community through student shared learning platforms e.g. Google Classroom, Bell Newsletters, the school website and local papers.

Music Ensemble Auditions 2022

Auditions for the Rock Band and Senior Vocal Ensemble will commence next week (Week 2). Grade 5 and 6 students have been given the opportunity to sign up during their Music class this week. Vocal auditions will be held first, followed by instrumental auditions. These usually run over several weeks due to the large number of students interested.

I have spoken in detail with Grade 5 and 6 students about the process and expectations, should they decide to audition.

- Students can audition by singing or playing an instrument (or both).
- They should prepare one (or two) short piece/s (approx. 30-45 seconds per piece) that showcases the best of what they can do.
- Two questions will also be asked: Why do you want to be in an ensemble? What strengths can you bring to the group? This gives students the opportunity to add anything else they want me to know (e.g. musical/dance/drama passion they might have, music lessons undertaken, song writing they might be doing, confidence or personal goal they are working on, etc).

I will endeavour to inform students which day their audition will be held so they can be prepared or bring their own instrument if need be.

I encourage all interested students to audition as it is a great experience, regardless of the outcome. I look forward to hearing all the musical talent that Bell has to offer in the coming weeks!

2022 Grade 6 Student Leadership Positions:

At Bell Primary School we are committed to building the capacity of student voice, agency and leadership to promote greater school pride. Through various leadership conferences and workshops, we endeavour to empower students to influence change and provide them with opportunities to collaborate and make decisions, with adults, around school programs they value, by directing and taking responsibility for the launch and/or proposed changes of these programs.

In 2022, five new leadership initiatives have been established for interested Year 6 students to apply for. The role descriptions of these positions (outlined by 2021 students) are open for negotiation/change once students are elected to roles. The application and selection process for each position has been decided on through consultation with students and staff who will be working closely with students in each role. This means our Grade 6 leadership positions will go from 10 in previous years to 42 in 2022.

Junior School Council News:

It's a new year and we are keen to get the ball rolling with a new JSC team, elections will be held in the coming weeks.

If your child is interested in participating in this year's elections, please have a chat to them about the role and skills required to be a JSC rep (see below), as well as the commitment to weekly meetings. A meeting will be held during class time each fortnight and during a lunchtime every alternate week so as to minimise disruptions to learning and play times. Individual classes will hold elections at different times throughout Week 4 (14 - 18 Feb), class teachers will advise their students on specific dates. Grade 6 JSC elections will be held earlier in Week 3.

Role of JSC rep:

- Be a positive role model for all students at the school
- Attend meetings each week (lunchtime or classtime)
- Lead class meetings & complete a Parking Lot fortnightly
- Provide a voice for students in your grade at meetings
- Clearly present discussions and decisions that Junior School Council has made to your class
- Work collaboratively to implement initiatives such as fundraisers, awareness campaigns & whole school activities.



Skills required:

- Excellent speaking and listening skills
- Works well with others
- Always displays Bell PS values
- Commitment
- Organisation
- Responsibility



Junior School Council Guidelines

Rationale

The Junior School Council will provide an opportunity for students to develop leadership, communication and interpersonal skills and have empowerment in the decision making process of Bell Primary School. The Junior School Council aims to:

- Develop caring and responsible attitudes within the children
- Provide an avenue for the development of student voice and agency within the school
- Provide students with a sense of pride and achievement
- Raise student awareness of local and global issues and associated support options.

Definitions

- Student Voice provides opportunities for students to collaborate and make decisions with adults
 around what and how they learn, and how we can improve the school environment together.
- Student Agency gives students the power to direct and take responsibility for their learning and
 actioning improvements to the school environment. This supports students to become
 independent and self-regulated learners and members of the community.
- Student Leadership includes listening to and being able to clarify the issues of the students they
 represent and advocating on their behalf. Student leaders have an increased sense of
 responsibility to help others and to model Bell values.

Guidelines

- Junior School councillors are recognised as leaders in the school community.
- One Junior School Council representative is elected from each grade from years 3-6, using the democratic process. (see references at the end of this policy)
- · Regular meetings are held weekly where possible
- Representatives will be made aware of their roles and responsibilities as school leaders.
- Decisions made are reported to all students, teachers and parents.
- Vice representatives' attend meetings in the absence of leaders.
- A notice will be placed in Bell News and on grade level Compass posts to inform parents and the community of the timeline for the process.

Implementation

- One student from each grade (Year 3 to Year 6) is elected by their peers to be classroom delegates at Junior School Council meetings. (see 'Steps for Selection' at the end of this document).
- Elected Junior School Council representatives are presented with a badge of office in recognition
 of their important role in the school community. Their names will be published in Bell News.
- · Weekly meetings are held with the Junior School Council teacher support team.
- An agenda is set at the beginning of each meeting. Students have the opportunity to raise issues as part of each meeting agenda.
- At the first meeting of each school semester Junior School Council will discuss individual and collective roles and responsibilities.
- Minutes will be taken, then two/three reps will report to leadership, minuting their responses to
 queries. These minutes will be published and provided to all classes in the school.
- Representatives will report against minutes taken and discuss with their class peers, issues raised
 at the meetings. Items can also be raised which may be brought to subsequent Junior School
 - Council meetings. Students will be selected to report back to classes without a representative (Prep/Grade 1/2)
- Vice representatives' will represent leaders when unavailable due to absence.
- Junior School Councillors will be required, on occasion, to represent the school community at informal and formal occasions.
- Students will have opportunities to support various foundations or by contributing to fundraising activities arranged within the school community or by outside agencies.
- A Social Service fundraiser may be undertaken once a term. The focus of this will be decided by Junior School Council representatives after discussion with supervising teachers, and after feedback from classes and staff.

Selection of JSC Representative Process

- 1. Discuss the role of the Junior School Council.
- 2. Discuss the role of Junior School Council representatives.
- 3. Discuss the responsibilities of the representatives.
- 4. Call for nominations.
- Students to be given time to prepare a speech or presentation. Elections will be held in week 4 Monday 14 – Friday 18th February.
- 6. Collect votes via a 'secret' ballot. Remind students they can vote for themselves.
- The student with the most votes will be elected Junior School Council representative for the class.The student with the second most will be elected 'Vice Representative.
- Badges will be presented at a whole school assembly to the JSC representative (date to be confirmed).

New to orienteering?

The checkpoints are marked by flags on the ground and may be along paths, fences, buildings or garden beds. The challenge is to race between each one, choosing your own route between the checkpoints, using a special detailed colour orienteering map (which you get to keep too).

Works notification: Road closures – Murray Road

Work is now underway to remove four dangerous and congested level crossings at Oakover Road, Bell Street, Cramer Street and Murray Road, and build new stations at Bell and Preston. The level crossings will be removed by raising the rail line over the roads, improving safety and accessibility, and delivering new community open spaces.

Works to build the section of rail bridge over Murray Road and along Clinch Avenue will take place between Monday 14 February and Tuesday 1 March.

To safely facilitate our works, there will be some day and night closures of Murray Road.

Delivery and installation of the bridge segments needs to occur at night due to Department of Transport regulations, when traffic volumes are greatly reduced, and trains are not running.

Deliveries are dependent on a range of factors including weather conditions. Every effort will be made to complete these works on schedule but, dates are subject to change.

Impacted residents and businesses will receive more information closer to the time as works start in your area.

Changes to the way you travel:

Murray Road, including footpaths, will be closed to traffic and pedestrians, at the level crossing from:

Full closures (day and night)

- 7pm Monday 14 February to 6am Wednesday 16 February
- 7am Tuesday 22 February to 6am Wednesday 23 February
- 7pm Monday 28 February to 5pm Tuesday 1 March

- 7pm to 6am Wednesday 16, Thursday 17 and Friday 18 February

Detours will be in place for both traffic and pedestrians during these times. Please look for signage and follow traffic controller directions.

What to expect

- Night works from 7pm to 7am on various nights between Monday 14 February and Tuesday 1 March
- Some noise from machinery and tools
- Deliveries via St Georges Road and Murray Road
- Increased activity on site
- Temporary lighting towers and generators in place for night works


